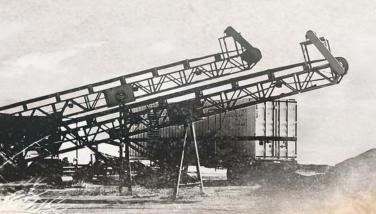

## FULL-TIMING ICONS

hen thinking of a single word that best describes the RV lifestyle "passion" always comes to mind first for me. That passion can be driven by camping close to nature in a tent trailer on weekends or by seasonal living in a large fifth-wheel. It's easy to get addicted to the freedom of rolling your home anywhere you want. And some people just keep on rolling full time, like authors Bill and Jan Moeller.

There's no telling exactly how many RVers full-time, but the number of people who have checked out of stationary neighborhoods is growing. The Moellers were the poster couple for the full-time RV lifestyle. As media executives, their work schedules in New York City pretty much kept them from seeing each other. One day Jan gave Bill an ultimatum, "We either leave these jobs or leave each other." They quit their high-paying jobs, sold the house, bought a boat and never looked back.

After 12 years of living on the water and publishing a number of marine books (which are still in print), the Moellers sold their boat and headed for land.

The progression to a travel trailer was natural. The boating lifestyle gave them intimate knowledge of full-time living in a mobile residence. Their boat was not exactly a yacht, but it did provide a foundation that led to a fulfilling life together. The transition to a travel trailer was a big one for the Moellers. For the first time in many years, they actually had a real bathroom with a real shower. Their antics for taking showers — among other crazy stories they shared on life aboard a boat — brought about many hilarious moments.

The Moellers were quintessential RV full-timers for 25 years. Their techniques and tips perfected over the years were published in the book, "Complete Guide to Full-Time RVing," first printed by this company in 1986. Eventually three editions of their popular book were penned. Their travels were well chronicled through Bill's camera lens and Jan's writing. Many of those articles showed up in this magazine and our sister publications, MotorHome and Highways.

To know Bill and Jan was to love them. While their unique personalities kept most people puzzled, everyone — either secretly or openly — was envious of their lifestyle. When Jan was diagnosed with terminal cancer eight years ago, she elected to stay in their fifth-wheel, where Bill cared for her until she closed her eyes for the last time. It was a storybook love affair that continued even after Jan's passing.

Bill stayed in his fifth-wheel until his own health declined. He fought and beat cancer multiple times. He attributed his remissions to the one scoop of ice cream he and Jan ate religiously every night. Maybe so, but his positive attitude and contagious and voracious laughter undoubtedly played big roles.

When I got the call that my good friend had passed away on January 17, my eyes welled up with sadness. The RV fraternity lost two great icons, but the Moellers' lessons of how life should be lived will always be imprinted. For that I'm forever grateful. 🗭

Two years ago, we stayed at the upper Caves Creek Campground, not too far from the caves, with small sites for truck campers or tents. There was only one camper besides us in the entire upper campground, in peak season. While my husband drove back down from the caves to our camp, I hiked the trail back to it. It followed Cave Creek down.

The lower camp (Grayback Campground), large enough for trailers, is at the base of the winding road up to the caves, and was busier but not full.

Caves Creek offers primitive amenities and will not accommodate large RVs. Grayback offers running water and flush toilets. Visit www.nps.gov/orca/plan-yourvisit/camping.htm to find out more.

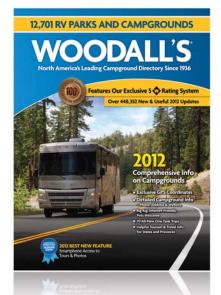

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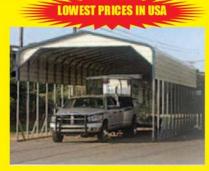

# A NOT-SO-SIMPLE RETURN

After purchasing the wrong parts from one dealer, this reader had his problems fixed elsewhere, but was having trouble returning the original parts. He asked for our help:

In the summer of 2010, we purchased a Four Winds Class C motorhome after moving over from a fifth-wheel. On a trip in October, I noticed that the driver's side in the rear was about 2 inches lower than the curb side. After a call to Four Winds, Dave Bernard there recommended taking it to a body shop and suggested longer U-bolts and a wedge put on the driver's side. I took the rig to the Pro Shop in Oxnard, California. There, Joey Diaz checked out the rig to see which parts were needed, then we were to set up an appointment for the work once the parts were in. During that time, our house sold and had a 45-day escrow. Since I am the only driver (and packer), I did not have the time to take the motorhome in. As a goodwill gesture, I did offer to pay for the parts which I thought I could use at a later date. The charge for the U-bolts and wedge was \$368.13. With everything going on, I did not question the cost at that time. (He ordered four U-bolts when only two were needed.)

After moving to Washington, I took the rig to Brazel's RV Performance in Centralia, Washington. They stated, "The spacer supplied by the customer is the wrong size and doesn't bolt in. The U-bolt thread pitch is different." They did the repair and I am very happy with them and their work. The total charge for the parts was \$69.34 for two U-bolts and \$33.72 for one caster wedge, plus labor.

I started calling Mr. Diaz [from the Pro Shop] shortly thereafter to request a refund on the parts. He wanted me to send the parts to him and then he would send a refund. I did not feel comfortable doing

this and I asked for a letter from him stating that he would refund the cost when he received the parts. He refused to do this. After a few more calls with the same result, I sent him a certified letter stating that I was sending the parts to him and was expecting a refund to be sent to me. The parts were packed and sent via UPS (and delivered on August 24 and signed by "Diaz").

I have made numerous calls to Mr. Diaz and have received nothing but promises and excuses from him as to why he now has the parts and still refuses to give me a refund. Since it is physically impossible for me to go to Oxnard at this time, I was hoping you might be able to help.

We forwarded the letter to the Pro Shop to Mr. Diaz' attention in mid-October and did not receive a response. We did, however receive a follow-up correspondence from Mr. Muller on November 7, which tells us that the process worked:

Checking in on my credit card account, I noticed that there was a credit in the amount of \$368.13 from The Pro Shop. I can't thank you enough for helping to settle this. As I stated earlier, even though we now own a [Class C] motorhome (after years of owning trailers), we will continue to subscribe to *Trailer Life*. Keep up the good work. Thanks again, Joe Muller.

#### **OUT OF WARRANTY, OUT OF LUCK?**

A recurring problem with the bodywork on a trailer has extended beyond that vehicle's warranty period. So who is responsible? Our reader wanted to know:

We purchased a 2008 Heartland Sundance 2900RK fifth-wheel in July of 2007 from Jim May Heartland, a dealership that is no longer in business, of Findlay, Ohio. Upon our first trip one week later, we no-

ticed a basketball-sized spot above the bedroom door delaminating. We immediately alerted the dealer to the problem. They wanted to wait to see what else went wrong. At that time nothing did, just that one spot. After lengthy back-and-forth with the dealer and Heartland, a local body shop fixed the spot.

Fast forward a year later and out of warranty by just a few weeks. Upon uncovering our unit we saw it had numerous [sites of] delamination on the entrance side, the whole back panel and a small spot underneath the bedroom slideout. We immediately contacted Jim May once again. The dealer was diligent in working with us and Heartland to get this resolved. I emailed numerous pictures and was in constant contact with someone in charge. This went on for about three months. I had an "inside" contact within the company and used that to see if they could get anything done for us. Finally Heartland agreed to repair all the delamination if we brought it out to Elkhart, Indiana. That would be in September of 2008. Since it was so late in the year it was agreed upon that we'd deliver the trailer in April of 2009. As we did, Heartland replaced the whole back panel and fixed all the marked spots we pointed out. We felt at the time the whole panel on the entrance side should be replaced, but it wasn't. We were just grateful for what they were doing. We picked the unit up in June 2009.

All was well when we uncovered it this year, until we noticed a spot again above the bedroom window. The fiberglass was bubbling again, so very little. And now we have two cracks in the fiberglass in that area and one by the back compartment—all on the entrance side. This time I contacted Heartland and was directed to Michael Rogers. He said to send pictures and the VIN, and I did. I am enclosing emails that I received from Heartland on this issue. I sent them pictures as well (also included).

Our complaint is, even though it's out of warranty, the issue we are having now is a direct result of not properly fixing the fiberglass from the beginning. What would make fiberglass crack, anyway? We realize that a company has to put a cut-off[point] somewhere, but this is ongoing. Now we have a trailer with no resale value. Who'd buy a trailer that's had that much repair to it? Heartland has refused to repair this – we were advised to take it to a body shop at our expense.

The manufacturer would likely prevail in a court case, because the owner would have to draw a very direct line of cause and effect, and tying cracking (usually caused by frame flexing) to delamination issues would be very difficult. But the court of customer service and public opinion has different standards. Here's the re-

sponse from Heartland, which we found to be uncommonly generous:

This letter is in response to the letter we received regarding Terry and Linda Aukerman. We contacted the customer and offered them the opportunity to return the coach to Heartland and we will perform the needed repairs at no charge to them. The customer accepted this as a fair resolution. This issue should be resolved.

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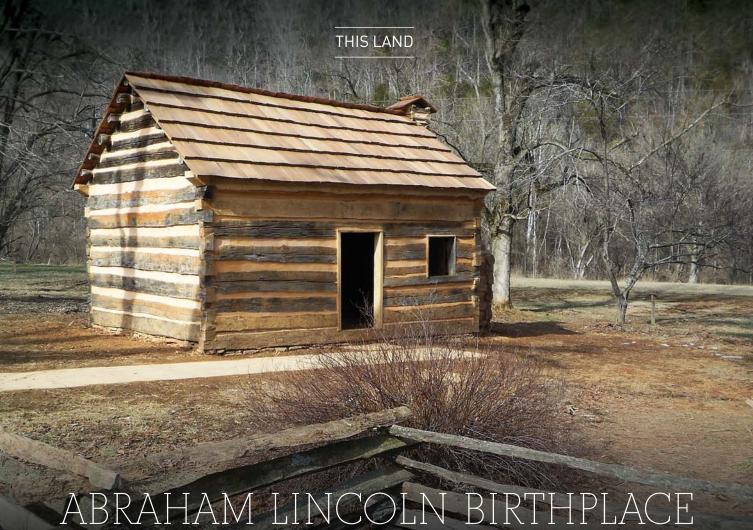

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# ABRAHAM LINCOLN BIRTHPLACE NATIONAL HISTORIC PARK

nly about 50 miles from the incomparable Mammoth Cave, another of Kentucky's attractions draws travelers who are interested in American history. Although George Washington is often viewed as the father of our nation, perhaps no one has done more to shape the country we live in today than Abraham Lincoln. RVers who visit the Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Park, which consists of the Birthplace Unit and the Boyhood Home Unit at Knob Creek, will surely feel a thrill traversing the same grounds that the boy who grew up to become the 16th president of the United States once walked.

In the visitor center of the Birthplace Unit, the Bible that belonged to Abraham's parents, Thomas and Nancy Lincoln, is on display. Biblical references often appear in Lincoln's writing, and religion played a large role in his life. A 15-minute orientation film provides insights into the Lincolns' life in Kentucky, and the exhibit hall helps explain what living in a frontier cabin was like.

Within the impressive Memorial Building, which features one granite step for each of Lincoln's 56 years, stands a cabin that replicates the one in which Lincoln was born. Sinking Spring flows nearby, a spring from which Lincoln first drank.

Visitors can enjoy hiking trails and a picnic area on the 116-acre property.

"My earliest recollection is of the Knob Creek place," wrote Lincoln. From the age of 2-and-a-half until he was nearly 8, Lincoln lived on and explored the 30 acres his family rented on Knob Creek farm. And had it not been for the quick wits and reflexes of his boyhood friend Austin Gollaher,



Lincoln may have drowned in swollen Knob Creek when he fell in while playing on a log. Austin, however, grabbed a long tree branch, supported one end, then offered the other to Abraham, who pulled himself in.

Years later, when Abraham had become President Lincoln, he wrote about Gollaher's heroics.

Various ranger programs allow children of all ages to learn about Lincoln's formative years. Admission is free, and the sense of history is palpable.

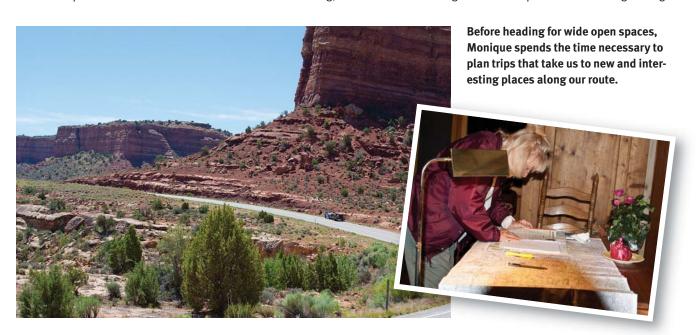

I couldn't think of any reason not to, other than having told East Coast friends we were heading their way.

Going to Alaska was a chance to put a dent on our list of states and provinces visited. Other than our love for traveling,

no matter where we go, the only goal we have is to visit all the states and as many provinces as is practical as RVers. We still have 14 eastern states and Hawaii to check off (we've been to them all, just not with an RV), plus 11 provinces. We doubt that we will ever get to Nunavut or the Northwest Territories of Canada, but even if we never make it to all of the United States it doesn't matter.

I wrote during our trip to Alaska that I didn't know I had a bucket list until we saw the Canadian Rockies. Dozens of people, articles and TV reports have extolled the beauty of Acadia National Park in Maine. I can't wait to put down stabilizers along the shore of the Atlantic up there, but the real expectation is the adventures ahead of us in getting there. Big Bend is on our list. We don't look forward to the drive down to the bottom of Texas but we want to make the trip to another of America's most beautiful places. We expect that to fall into the category of "worth the drive."

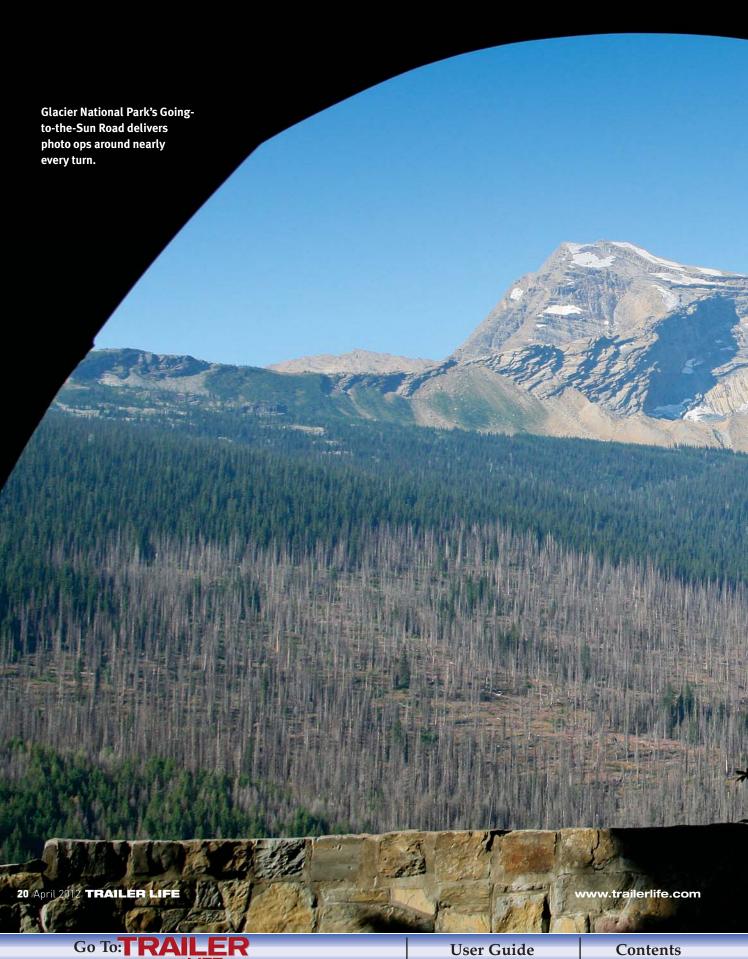
If you don't have a bucket list or at

least a traveling theme, think about what excites you. We always love to be in the right place at the right time for a blues festival, while close friends try to take in all the bluegrass fests they can schedule. New Orleans' Jazz & Heritage Festival is a treat for music lovers of every popular genre. But maybe opera, symphonies, Broadway plays or watching Elvis impersonators at casinos is your thing.

Learn what you can about what's happening within a driveable distance and work to make it happen. It's amazing what barriers fall when you say, "We want to visit such and such in June two years from now." You've consciously set your goal and a time frame for it to become a reality.

The best part is that even if the location or performance isn't memorable, it's the journey that will stay with you over the years when your traveling days are over ... when it's the trips you've taken that will bring tears of joy to your eyes.





# GLACIALAPPEAL

While its rugged mountains dominate the field of vision, Glacier National Park offers more for visitors than meets the eye

s adventures go, I wasn't expecting much. After all, I had been told the two-and-a-half-hour excursion I'd be taking required participants be at least 54 inches tall and at least 10 years old – the kind of restrictions enforced at amusement parks, not in the great outdoors. Sporting endeavors worth sweating through generally employ a principle similar to caveat emptor – participate at one's own risk. And, before you start, please sign this waiver form.

After taking a short ride from the village at Montana's Whitefish Mountain Resort to a canvas tent called Cougar Camp, a name earned when two cougars leapt from the tent one morning, I began to reassess the forthcoming activity called Walk in the Treetops. When our guide, Inge, pointed to a wooden pole and told us a grizzly bear left the huge gashes in the wood, I knew my second cup of coffee had been superfluous - I was now wide awake. A married couple from Seattle and I were soon fitted with climbing harnesses attached to stout ropes, which were outfitted with specialized contraptions that would secure us to the steel cables that run from tree to tree.

This will be no Disney ride, I thought, and then set out on the half-mile hike to the start of our elevated, arboreal endeavor.

#### VIEW FROM THE TOP

As intense as the buildup was, however, the Walk in the Treetops proved to be as wonderful and unique as the entire Glacier National Park region. The area offers plenty of hardcore outdoor activities for travelers so inclined, but RVers seeking nothing more adrenaline-inducing than gawking at nearly unending scenery and watching wildlife forage through untrammeled terrain can easily stay entertained for a week here. Travelers willing to test the limits of their comfort zones - to raft the Middle Fork Flathead River, to hire a guide and float in a drift boat in search of native west-slope cutthroat trout or mountain bike on single-track trails through forests thick with grand fir and cottonwoods - will be hard pressed to find better adventures than those in Glacier Country, Montana.

On the hike to the platforms, Inge proved so enthusiastic about the bear grass, devil's club, thimbleberry and wild ginger, among many plants along the trail, that I was forced to admit my

botanical knowledge allowed me only to distinguish a shrub from a tree.

We soon stepped onto a platform, hooked onto the cables with our safety ropes (which would prevent us from falling), and began our walk in the trees. We carefully stepped on boards that were suspended below the safety cables; though to call the tilted, bouncy surface a boardwalk would be inaccurate. The walkway seemed far less stable than it proved to be and it was inevitable that one or all of us would make a Tarzan reference.

The walkway, on average, is suspended 30 feet above the forest floor, with a high point of 70 feet in the trees. Travelers with a fear of heights would be wise to find their outdoor thrills elsewhere. I thoroughly enjoyed the soft adventure that Walk in the Treetops provided. Since I have never experienced anything like it, I believe most travelers will at the very least appreciate the novelty of the activity. The entire elevated route covers only 800 feet, but it's a distance I'll fondly remember.

#### **HIT THE CYCLERS' SLOPES**

A couple hours later I found myself pedaling a mountain bike up the trails that cross the slopes of Whitefish Mountain. The resort's chairlifts were being updated, part of the recent transition from what used to be called Big Mountain Resort, and I was grateful for the exercise. I hopped on a rental bike, provided by Snow Ghost Outfitters, located in the village of Whitefish Mountain Resort, and slowly fought gravity as a guide named Michal from Snow Ghost Outfitters pedaled in front of me, providing commentary and cheering me on. My mountainbiking experience is limited, so I was grateful the route was not too extreme.

Whitefish Mountain's best asset in regards to mountain biking is its variety. As Michal put it, "We offer terrain for novices as well as experts. We have the skills park, which uses a lot of the newage ladders, a lot of drops, things oriented purely towards downhill." From my novice point of view, the skills park looked like a place where lemmings

came to their untimely ends, a perception that reinforced the feeling that my mountain biking skills have plenty of room for improvement.

Since I love unusual experiences and soft adventures, my smile seemed permanently affixed. Yet my stint at Whitefish Mountain Resort was a bonus, since Glacier National Park had truly drawn me to the region. The town of Whitefish sits just down the hill from the resort, and visitors can shop in boutiques and galleries, golf on two championship courses or indulge in fine dining. I, however, had a national park to explore.

An hour or so of driving east on U.S. 2 through quiet small towns and past more RV parks than I can remember seeing in so short a stretch deposited me in West Glacier. That summer day the small tourist hub on the western edge of the park was abuzz with travelers from around the world, each trying to decide how best to spend time in the park. The Middle Fork Flathead River beckoned to a high percentage of the visitors, so they

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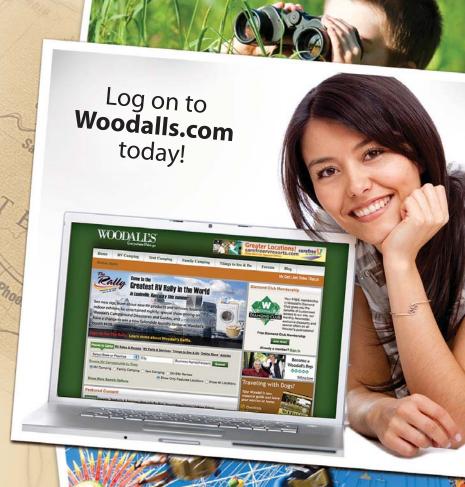
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signed on for a river float with Glacier Raft Company. Other travelers laced up their hiking boots, then studied maps trying to decide which of the more than 730 miles of trails to explore.

As I ate lunch in a small cafe, a man at the next table asked me if I could recommend a fishing guide who could "put [him] on some Montana trout." Lakestream Fly Shop in Whitefish could meet that objective, I told him. In a souvenir shop, two German tourists asked a sales clerk about the effectiveness of the bear bells the shop sold (not very effective, came the answer; hiking in groups is far safer, and carrying bear repellent also makes sense). Grizzlies and black bears roam Glacier, but hikers are not likely to encounter any ursine creatures among the park's million-plus acres if they take precautions.

#### TRAVERSE THE TERRAIN

Visitors who want to encounter bears, however, should take a Red Bus Tour. In fact, I highly recommend that everyone

who intends to explore Glacier sign up for one of the 11 tours. Ranging from two-and-a-half to nine-and-a-half hours, these tours provide context to the scenery travelers might otherwise see but are not likely to understand. The drivers deliver commentary on the flora and fauna, the migration and dissolution

of the glaciers that carved the valleys, plate tectonics and the establishment of the park. They communicate with the drivers of other buses about where wildlife is located, and answer questions from curious tour-takers.

Yet as fascinating as the drivers are, they are not the stars of the Glacier Na-

tional Park show; the scenery and the buses share the marquee. In order to deliver the best perspective for taking in the park's soaring peaks and hanging valleys, the White Motor Company built 25-foot long touring coaches that seat 17 passengers.

These vehicles, built from 1936 through 1939 and painted an alluring shade of red, deliver a stylish ride through the gorgeous terrain. Yet their functionality sets them apart; the canvas roofs roll back, granting tourists unobstructed skyward views of such distinctive features as

the Garden Wall and Triple Divide Peak. The drivers of these sleek rigs were once called Jammers, a linguistic nod to the days when they had to manually jam the gears as they negotiated the tricky ascents and descents along the famous Going-to-the-Sun Road. Ford overhauled the fleet of aging vehicles a while ago, and now the automatic red buses run on propane, making them more environmentally friendly than before.

On the Lake McDonald Crown of the Continent Tour, an eight-hour excursion that left Lake McDonald Lodge at 9 a.m.,





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we battled the morning cold as we passed through a forest thick with hemlock and cedars. Soon we left the Mc-Donald Valley behind, ascending Goingto-the-Sun Road, clinging to the edge of a glacier-formed arête, on the flanks of the Continental Divide. The road itself is a National Civil Engineering Landmark. Built between 1921 and 1937, it features a revolutionary design that dramatically lessened the environmental impact the original 15 planned switchbacks would have caused. Going-to-the-Sun Road has only one major change of direction, called the Loop, a design feature that maximizes views.

The scenery was spectacular that morning, since the smoke from the wild-fires that choked the valleys much of the summer had dissipated a few days before. After exploring the panoramic vistas of Logan Pass, where I spied grazing Rocky Mountain goats before seeing bighorn sheep scurry across a ridge near Many Glacier Hotel, I considered my Red Bus Tour a total success. Throughout the day we had also seen six bears, four grizzlies and two black bears, so the trip rated somewhere above a total success.

Visitors to Glacier and Waterton Lakes National Park, a contiguous Canadian park to the north, who have more time to explore may want to set out on a hike. The Trail of the Cedars and the Swiftcurrent Nature Trail represent the easy end of the spectrum. The Carthew-Alderson Trail, with its 12-mile one-way route to Waterton Park, holds down the strenuous end. The Highline Trail is generally regarded as a must-do for travelers who are relatively fit. Beginning at Logan Pass, this 7.6-mile scenic bonanza parallels the Garden Wall and delivers hikers to the Granite Chalet Park.

#### **SETTLE IN**

So many more outdoor options exist in Glacier: boat tours on Lake McDonald, horseback riding, golfing, bicycling and fishing for five kinds of trout, Kokanee salmon, Arctic grayling and whitefish. RVers may want to stay in various campgrounds to experience the park's attractions. Apgar, on Lake McDonald's south shore, is open early May through mid-October and features 192 sites; St. Mary,

located one mile from the St. Mary entrance, is open late May through late September and has 148 campsites, with rigs limited to 35 feet. A handful of other campgrounds accommodate RVs, and for travelers to appreciate the magnitude of Glacier National Park, to experience even a small fraction of its wonders, RVers may have to settle into a different campground on each return visit.

As for me, I can't return to Glacier Country soon enough. 🗭

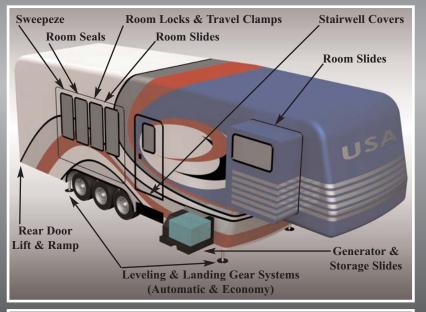

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grew up picturing the desert as I saw it on Saturday morning TV westerns. That impression — of uninhabitable expanses that required 100 gallons of water to drive across — stayed with me until I experienced the desert for myself.

As RVers, we seek variety in our camping spots. My wife, Monique, can't wait to return to the ocean shores. I love being in rugged mountains. We look forward to our stops in the woods or by a lake alongside a meadow. We visit cities, too, but we prefer nature. And the desert presents a nature all its own.

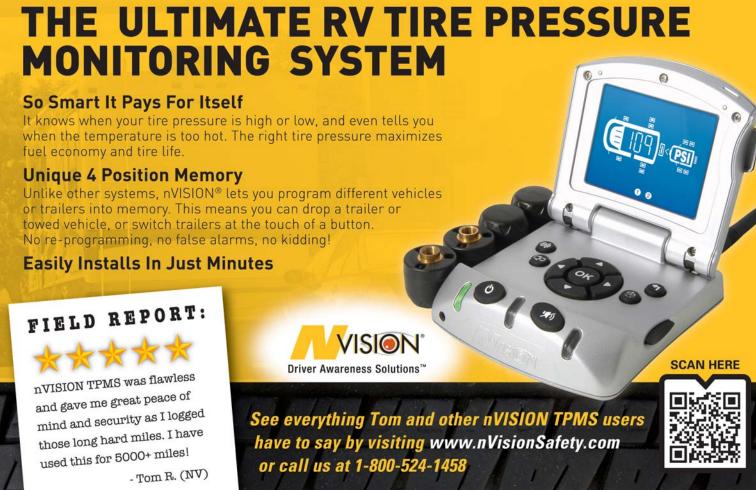
After winding up a week in Death Valley, we decided to stay a few days longer to linger in the beautiful emptiness and serenity that surrounded us. We had grown to love the ever-changing vistas that start with the early morning sun illuminating peaks of surrounding hills and mountains. The creviced hills have their own character, much like the faces of old cowboys and miners who dwelt under the scorching sun for seemingly endless years.

As the sun rises in the sky, the mountains lose most of their color and harsh outlines. Then, a few hours later, pastel purples, dark greens, pale blues and dim gray hues begin to tint the stark landscape, set apart by those deep shadows akin to a stained glass win-

dow. And at night the sky is amazing, like a black and white version of Times Square or the Las Vegas Strip. How long can you be entertained looking at the twinkling planets and ever-present stars, deep set throughout the ebony background? Long enough to see a me-





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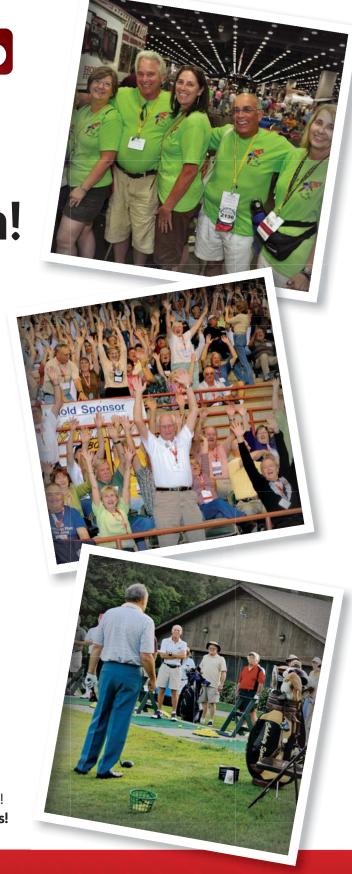
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teorite flash across your line of vision. Long enough to find a manmade satellite cruising from one horizon through deep space to the other end of the universe. That's when you fault the moon for shining too much light on your night-time sky.

The darkened desert offers a special experience. You can easily see our sun's neighboring stars in the Milky Way, with

all of this being accompanied by the songs of distant baying coyotes. You can hear sounds from miles away when the wind behaves, like the cry of a disturbed crow, a branch tumbling across the desert floor or the screech of an owl. Every now and then, breaking the si-

lence is a far-away truck plying the nighttime highways or a plane rushing to find landing lights hundreds of miles over the horizon.

The desert is, among other things, a visual experience. As many people forget even when they are in the middle of



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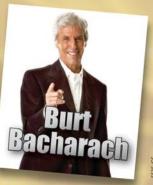
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it, this is a place that can best be appreciated by focusing outward, instead of on the HDTV on the trailer wall. It's a place to take comfort in how small we are in this vast world.

Monique and I find that we gain our greatest appreciation for our desert surroundings when we take the opportunity to do more than contemplate the beauty but actually become part of it. How do we do this? We forget about the maps and points of interest. As we drive through the varied terrains, we stop when we find a place that offers some interesting rock formation, greenery or barrenness. Except on a few curvy mountain roads, there are often pullouts or shoulders that can accommodate our 50 feet of truck and trailer, and miraculously, they are where we would want to pause in our journey for a while.

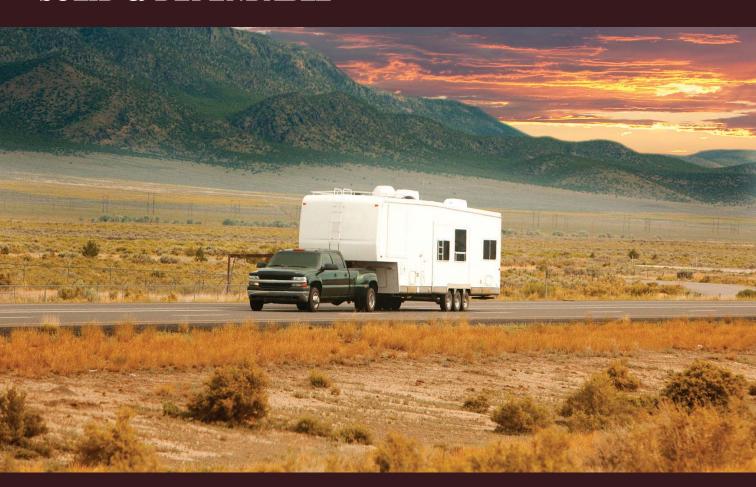
Whether we're along a paved road or walking a dirt trail, we find the spot and settle in. It takes me a few minutes to get over looking at every sight as a photo op, eventually focusing on the array of shapes, colors and flow of the land. I finally make the transition. Instead of looking at the scenery, it's time to immerse myself in the surroundings. As one ranger put it, "just be there" without letting your mind think about each element across the expanse. By that time, your brain already knows what a desert looks like – your mind can soon appreciate this as an opportunity to embrace the feeling of these fascinating surroundings.

In deserts with cactus and vegetation, we wonder how it all survives and even thrives. We see a spindly tree holding on for dear life on a bald boulder and wonder if that's actually possible. A yellow flower smiles down from a crevice between two rocks, reminding us that

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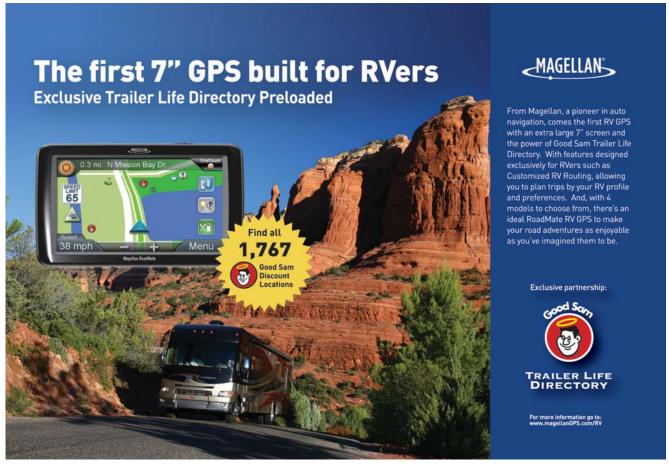

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the harshness of the environment is an intrinsic part of desert life. One never tires of seeing a saguaro cactus' arms stretched upward, silhouetted against a rosy sunset or the bright red flowers that line an ocotillo's branches like Christmas lights along the eaves of a home.

As more and more of the Earth's surface is electrified, the chance of finding the almost absolute darkness of night will continue to diminish. We also learned during a ranger talk that the stars of the Big Dipper are moving apart at a rate of millions of miles an hour. It will be about 10,000 years before the constellation is no longer discernable from our world.

#### WELL WORTH IT TO DO WITHOUT

Camping in the desert takes planning and the willingness to overlook minor hardships, like running out of coffee or losing cell phone reception. Who camps in the desert? Travelers in all the standard RV types, although high winds can take their toll on pop-ups.

Among the thousands of rigs that drove hundreds of miles to attend 49er Encampment Days in Death Valley's Furnace Creek (www.deathvalley49ers.org) were a few time-worn models, pockmarked from years of blowing sand and faded by the harsh sun. But there were almost as many glistening half-million dollar motor coaches, the conveyances of choice for those who haven't let wealth blind them from the world as it was carved millions of years ago.

As I write this from my RV "office," I glance out our rear windows at forbidding stones and gravel, probably here



The 1849 gold rush wagon trains are celebrated during Death Valley's 49er Encampment Days.



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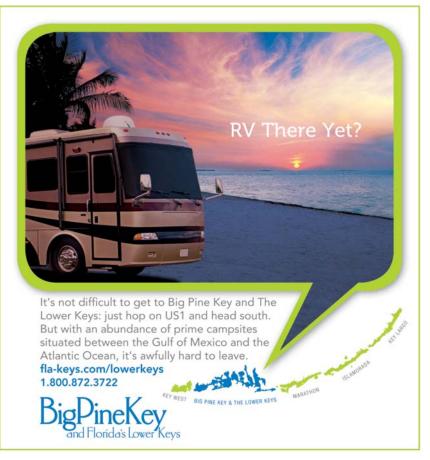
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Prospectors often stayed in stone dugouts while searching for gold. Somehow, vegetation survives in Death Valley.

since lakes submerged this area for thousands of years. Some 500 yards beyond us are a series of café-au-lait colored mounds into which it appears as if a stream of half-and-half cream has been poured but hasn't settled. Immediately behind the mounds are higher, sharper knolls, with a lavender hue at 10 a.m., turning to a tan, then to chocolate brown later in the day.

Our view of the rest of the world is hidden by a line of high hills, jagged and coarse, shaded a hundred different earth tones and lined with black highlights. Fortunately it doesn't take climbing higher to see forever. It's all encompassing.

"Away out here they've got a name for wind and rain and fire/The rain is Tess. the fire's Joe and they call the wind Mariah." The Kingston Trio nailed it when they singled out the wind for adoration. It blows the world around, particularly in spurts at night, scattering anything not held down. It's part of the experience.

When you hear the word "desert," you may think about Hopalong Cassidy drifting through sagebrush on a bed of rocky sand, spurs jingling or stopping by a remote oasis. That is the setting of the desert, but there is also the poetic aspect, the grand stillness and rejuvenating sense of the eternal.

There is no scene in nature any more incredible than a sand dune blown into place hundreds of years ago and constantly rising higher and dropping lower as the winds breathe life over billions of sand grains. And across the top of those grains are footprints of a variety of critters that inhabit the area year-round, plus remnants left in the path of tumbleweeds.

When wildflowers appear miraculously from the barren terrain in the spring (which is never a certainty), the visitors viewing them do more than see the splendor; they feel it. Rather than being afraid of the desert, cherish it. It's an experience like no other.

From the Never-Bored RVers, we'll see you on down the road. 🗭

n recent years, building lighter weight units without sacrificing amenities has become the rule rather than the exception. Therefore, it's up to the manufacturers to do their best to get their products to stand out from the pack.

It's no longer acceptable to simply offer a large, relatively lightweight floorplan; consumers have come to expect practical, user-friendly trailers that are easy to tow and that feature designs to make their home away from home more livable than ever before.

To that end, KZRV has designed the new Spree LX Superlite 321 RES with family-oriented RVers in mind, making sure that their experiences inside the trailer are as memorable as those outside.

The highlight of the Spree is the dual-slide rear living area, and why not? That's where most RV-owning families will spend the majority of their time while inside the trailer. Curbside, dual recliners with a handy magazine table offer mom and dad a great place to relax and sit down with a good book, while the streetside slide contains the convertible sofa bed (with inflatable mattress, \$690) and large U-shaped dinette that will comfortably seat the whole family.

The sofa and dinette also offer the ideal seating area to view the optional 26-inch LCD TV (part of the \$1,885 LX package, which also gets you such niceties as aluminum wheels and a



fiberglass front cap) located in the rear entertainment center, which not only houses a CD/DVD/AM/FM stereo with surround sound, but also offers plenty of shelves for books, DVDs and the like. Above and below those shelves is even more storage space for larger items, a much-appreciated design feature that helps extend the long-term livability of the Spree.

The galley is exactly as you'd expect in a trailer this size, with the floorplan dictating the amount of counter space for food prep. A dual-basin sink

with an attractive high-rise faucet lends a bit of elegance, and the three-burner stove, range and microwave offer plenty of options for fine dining or simply zapping some popcorn or frozen pizzas.

The 6-cubic-foot refrigerator is large enough for a trailer this size and will handle your perishables, while the large pantry with adjustable shelves should be more than enough real estate for dry and canned food items. Pots, pans and silverware will likely be stored in the drawers and cabinet beneath the sink with room to spare.

The lav in the Spree continues KZ's trend of maximizing a limited amount of space, and actually feels a bit larger than it is. It doesn't exactly reach two-at-a-time territory, but there is more than enough room for one person to comfortably tend to grooming duties. Plus, at 6 feet 2 inches tall, I had adequate headroom in the shower, something I always covet.

The large linen closet in the bathroom

is a much-desired feature, at least for my family. The additional storage space helps keep the towels off the doors, shower-curtain rod and the beds, leaving them in the bathroom where they belong. Another nice touch is the stand-alone medicine cabinet, located on the adjoining wall to the sink (which has its own mirror on the wall above).

The master bedroom area in the Spree comes across as a bit plain, but that's because the large wall at the foot of the bed is just begging for the optional 19-inch TV (\$430), or perhaps some photos to personalize it. The mattress itself is comfortable enough, and the attractive head-board fastened to the wall helps break up some of the monotony. KZ has again come through with a practical design, offering nightstands on each side of the bed (thank you!) in addition to dual his and hers hanging wardrobes. Large cabinets above the bed should swallow duffels and bulky items with ease, and the carpeted

under-bed storage is yet another place to hide any eyesores.

The Spree is built on an all-aluminum frame, with heavy-duty I-beam construction, a heated and enclosed underbelly and a one-piece seamless roof doing their best to ensure longevity. The test trailer also includes the optional \$2,460 paint package. All new KZ trailers come with a one-year free roadside assistance plan from the factory.

The Spree is proof positive that KZ is determined to maximize the use of space and to provide customers with a pleasant RVing experience. The floorplan is sprinkled with thoughtful, user-friendly amenities – from the linen cabinet in the bathroom to the cup holders on each side of the sofa and beyond – which definitely make this lightweight, family-friendly model one to consider.

# On The Hunt

Western Kansas' Keystone Gallery Is Rife With Fossils Just Waiting To Be Discovered

eading south from Oakley, Kansas, a rustic town noted for the 1868 bison shoot in which William Cody became legendary "Buffalo Bill" Cody, U.S. Highway 83 cuts across terrain that is mostly as flat, round and brown as an old penny. But here and there along the 26 miles south to Keystone Gallery, our destination this brisk fall morning, the land features sprouting dagger-bladed yuccas, then rumples into low hills or splits with rugged outcrops of gold-colored rock and jagged arroyos exposing low, white-chalk scarps.

The few buildings you see as you drive are of yellow stone (as are the fence posts) because when they were new a century or more ago, there were

no trees. The evergreens clustered into the occasional windbreaks of today were imported, said artist Chuck Bonner, who with his wife, photographer Barbara Shelton, owns Keystone, a 900square-foot fossil world. When you pass the amusing "Pteranodon Ahead" sign, you're almost there.

Ringed by fat cedars, the gallery, originally Pilgrim Holiness Church built in 1916, and former parsonage next door where the couple now lives, are an oasis with high, wide views of the austerely beautiful plains and Smoky Hill River Valley. The river, a respectable stream in this arid land, meanders past just to the north. In the Wild West days, Butterfield Overland Dispatch stagecoaches ran along it.

From the gallery Bonner gestured to

a distant white bluff, which he called "Niobrara chalk," and said that type of formation, located along the river and its tributaries, is where the fossils he has spent his life hunting and studying are found – in deposits laid down millions of years ago when a vast, shallow sea covered the region. It receded about 65 million years ago as the Rockies were uplifted. Throughout the ages, hosts of the prehistoric sea creatures died and became embedded in the soft, chalklike sea floor, material similar to England's White Cliffs of Dover, Bonner explained.

#### **Fascination With Fossils**

Chuck Bonner, 57, grew up in Leoti, an hour or so southwest, where his father,

Marion, owned the local movie theater. But Marion Bonner was also an avid fossil hunter, and frequently probed this fossil-rich landscape with such noted paleontologists as George Sternberg, among others. And most weekends, the elder Bonner and his wife, Margaret, would load the family of 10 – Chuck, his three brothers and four sisters – into the 1949 Chevy Suburban nicknamed "Spiker" and drive to the chalk fields. Aged Spiker, garaged this day, is still the vehicle of choice for taking visitors on fossil-hunting expeditions, Chuck Bonner said with a smile.

Keystone, which opened in 1991 (and appears in the 2007 "1,000 Things To Do Before You Die" guidebook),

opens a window to a long-gone world, when during the late Cretaceous period 65 to 87 million years ago the waters teemed with life.

A mural Bonner painted on the gallery's rear wall depicts the ancient sea and the creatures that inhabited it, among them 20-foot sharks, 30-foot mosasaurs with two pairs of paddle limbs, giant squid, turtles similar to leatherbacks, clams with 3-foot wide shells, ammonites and huge fish with names like gillicus, pachyrhizodus, cimolichthys, bananogmius and xiphactinus. And swooping over the water in search of a snack are pteranodons, reptile-like creatures with 25-

foot wingspans.

Nearby, the fossilized skeleton of a 14-foot xiphactinus, a ferocious-looking animal with 3-inch fangs, hangs on one wall, and a 21-foot mosasaur covers much of another wall.

Glass-front cases hold fossilized saurodons, predatory fish with protruding lower jaws; numerous fanged xiphactinus heads; a plesiosaur paddle; disk-like caps from ammonite shells; shiny gray shark teeth; fish skulls and vertebrae; and dozens of other items, representing about 30 prehistoric species, most of them found by Bonner or Shelton. Bonner also pointed out the fossilized ink-bearing "pen" of a prehistoric squid named niobrarateuthis bonneri after Marion Bonner, who discovered the creature.

There's a surprisingly extensive gift shop, with rock specimens, stone carv-

ings, a silver jewelry set with malachite, carnelian, amethyst, black onyx, tiger eye and other stones; ammonites, shark teeth and other fossils; and books on related topics.

Shelton, 54, said she was a "city girl" from Mission, Kansas, studying political science at Fort Hays State University at the time Bonner was there as an art student. After they married they came to western Kansas, "so far off the grid there is no grid," she said. In 1980 they bought the church, which had stood empty for nearly 30 years, and the acre it stands on.

"Nothing was left of the place but four hinges," she said. "Even the baseboards were gone." But the couple and several friends, among them sculptor Pete Felten, who carved the bison statue out front, restored the antique structure for a museum and second-

story art studio for Bonner.

Keystone and the house are powered entirely by sun and wind, as the area is rarely lacking for stiff breezes. On this day blades on the windmill beside the house were whirling, and Shelton had lit the antique cast-iron woodstove that heats the gallery.

Among the family's finds are a 22foot mosasaur that hangs in the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History; an 80-million-year-old shark exhibited at Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History; and a 14-foot xiphactinus that swallowed a 6-foot gillicus on display at the Royal Tyrell Museum in Canada.

Most major natural history museums own specimens from the area, Bonner said. As far back as 1870, professors from Yale University came here to hunt fossils and claimed some 2,000 mosasaurs for the school's prestigious Peabody Museum. Bonner and Shelton have found more than 100 significant fossils, many of which are at universities and museums around the world. Bonner has also lectured on the subject at Yale and the Cincinnati Science Center.

His favorite place to lecture, he said with a smile, is in the chalk beds themselves, because many of Keystone's 3,500 annual visitors are interested in going on a hunt. He and his wife charge \$200 per person for full-day (8-hour) hunts and \$100 for half days. The full-day excursions, Bonner cautioned, "involve a lot of walking." Though the land is privately owned and fenced, for a fee (included) area ranchers allow fossil hunting.

On our brief excursion this blustery day – too cold for a long outing – Bonner almost immediately pointed to a tip of shiny gray poking from the chalk, a perfect shark tooth. He said the best time for hunting (preferably April through June, September and October) is right after a hard rain, which washes out the fossils.

If anything truly rare and important is found, Bonner reserves the right to keep it for the gallery or a museum. But because the area is so rife with fossils, he guarantees everyone will go home with treasure.

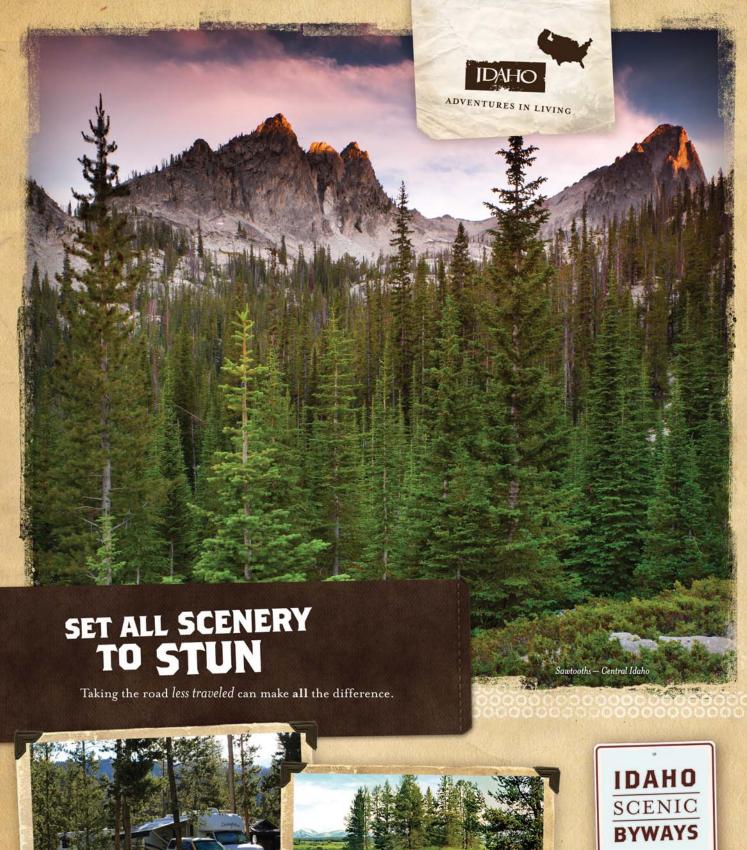

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### **More Fossil Finds**

Add another stop to your Kansas visit and check out Oakley's Fick Fossil and History Museum. The original collection of fossils belonged to Ernie and Vi Fick, who owned a ranch about 30 miles south, said Janet Bean, the museum director.

Over the years, Vi Fick found more than 11,000 shark teeth, many of which she turned into art, now displayed at the museum. Her 3-D works depicting flowers, trees, baskets, vases and others are of acrylic paint, papier-mâché and shark teeth, as well as reptile teeth, snails, vertebrae of various creatures and more.

Also on display is a fossilized mosasaur skeleton, rare in that its eye socket and teeth are intact, said Bean. George Sternberg, Marion Bonner's colleague who hunted the Smoky Hill area from 1924 to 1927 and was curator of paleontology at Fort Hays State College, collected many of the fossils. Among these are a plesiosaur paddle with sharktooth scars and a 15-foot xiphactinus.

The museum, which opened in 1975, also houses a replica of the town's 1886 depot, in addition to an array of hand-

carved wood toys from the 1930s; a lifesize furnished sod house typical of the area; wood carvings by Vi Fick; a mounted bison; cases of minerals from around the world; a Remington bronze called "Bronco Buster;" hundreds of historic photos from the area; and a plaque proclaiming Oakley as the "birthplace of the legend of Buffalo Bill."

In an 1868 competition between William Comstock, buffalo hunter from nearby Fort Wallace, and William Cody, from Iowa, who hunted the animals for railroad crews, Cody emerged the victor killing 69 bison in one day to Comstock's 46, and was thereafter known as "Buffalo Bill."

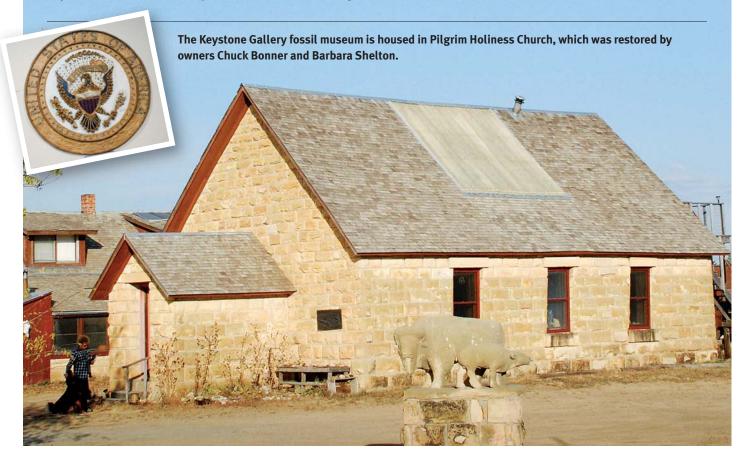

hese days, folding camping trailers aren't just tents on top of trailers. More often than not, they're loaded with amenities that include stoves, refrigerators, furnaces, holding tanks, rugged off-road packages and, in some cases, air conditioning. 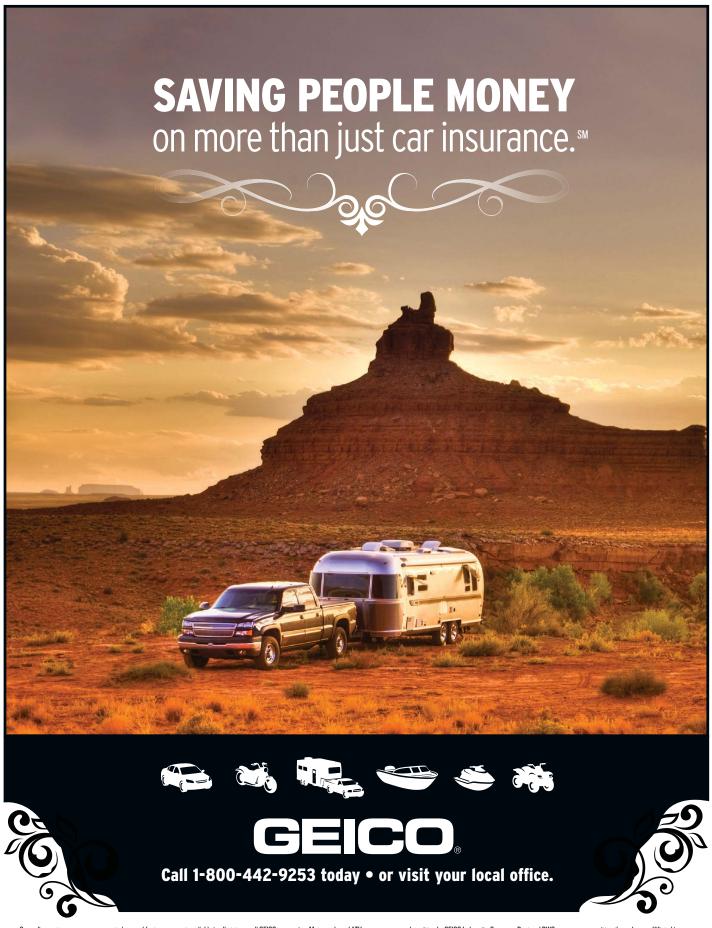

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## LEVELING SYSTEM UPGRADE

New add-on for Bigfoot automatic hydraulic fifth-wheel jacks features wireless key fob convenience

utomatic leveling jacks on a fifthwheel trailer are not only convenient, but they add an element of luxury that is sure to spoil any owner.

One of the more popular systems designed for fifth-wheel applications is made by Bigfoot Quadra Manufacturing, a company that's been on the scene for quite some time. These jacks work smoothly and reliably, and although it's hard to imagine making them even better, the company did so with a recently introduced upgrade panel that's supported by a handy and small remote control.

Bigfoot's basic leveling system installed at the factory on our fifth-wheel

is effective and well made. However, the user functions were limited to auto leveling, the ability to raise and lower only the front jacks manually and an emergency retract feature. For the past several years, Bigfoot Quadra has been developing an upgrade system that makes its fifth-wheel leveling system even more versatile, not to mention adding the benefit of being able to control the jacks remotely with a wireless key fob.

The key fob allows the user to hitch up without the need for another person to move the front jacks into position. Even better, Bigfoot incorporated an auto-reconnect feature, which remembers the height of the kingpin within an inch or two after disconnecting. All the driver has to do is back the truck close to the kingpin and push the key-fob button. The rear jacks will automatically retract and the front jacks will adjust to restore the fifth-wheel's original hitch height.

The new control panel offers more user options, such as side-to-side leveling as well as independent operation of the front and rear leveling jacks, which allows for precision leveling. Raising and lowering the jacks individually more than a few inches can cause the frame of the fifthwheel to twist, so caution must be exercised when applying this special feature.

The Bigfoot upgrade kit comes complete with everything you need for do-it-yourself installation except for a few cable ties, which can be used to tidy up the wires. The most time-consuming step was installing a rear sensor onto a frame cross member just behind the rear axle. From the rear sensor, a wiring harness must be run all the way to the front sensor.

Using longer bolts, I stacked the new front sensor on top of the old front sensor, allowing me to reconnect the old control panel in case the new system were ever to fail.

The new control panel is housed in a small plastic box. It's smaller in size and has a different shape than the original control panel. Bigfoot supplies a faceplate to make the new control panel fit properly into its designated mounting location.

In addition, there were about 10 extra feet of wiring harness between the front sensor and the control panel. Since the control panel mounts in its own plastic box, I decided to use hook and loop fasteners rather than attaching

it permanently. That gives us the option to take the Bigfoot control panel in hand while looking under the vehicle to watch the individual jacks during operation – if that ever becomes necessary.

Once all the components were in place, the system needed to be programmed. Using the manufacturer's simple instructions, the control panel and the wireless key fob were programmed within five minutes. Total installation time was about 1.5 hours.

It's easy to fall in love with this system right from the get-go. The upgrade kit really takes the Bigfoot leveling system for fifth-wheels to the next level. While effortless leveling is certainly convenient, the real bonus is the ability to hook up the fifth-wheel to the truck without anyone's assistance. This upgrade retails for \$495, but in our opinion, it's money well spent.

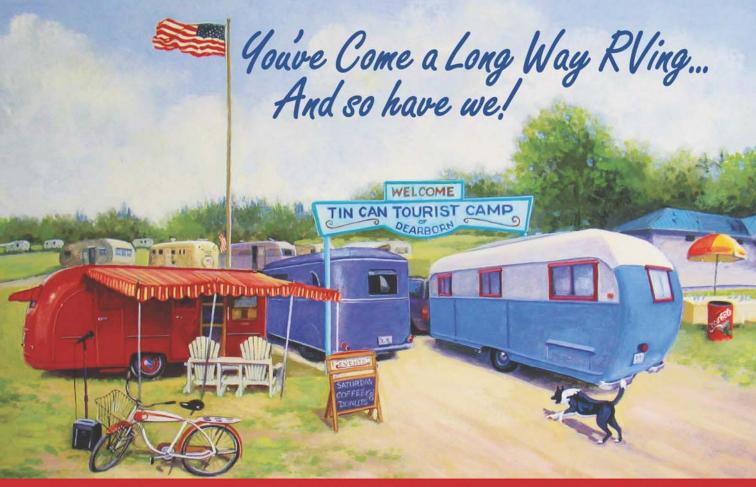
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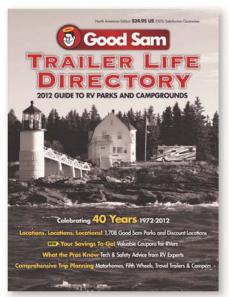
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### REPAIRING DUAL PANE WINDOWS

### BROKEN SEALS LEAD TO FOGGING, CLOUDINESS AND CONDENSATION, BUT THERE ARE SIMPLE SOLUTIONS TO THIS COMMON PROBLEM

ogging of dual pane windows in RVs is, unfortunately, a fact of life for many owners. Dual pane windows have been widely used in houses for decades and their energy savings are well documented, which is a major reason why they are also used in RVs. The air layer between the glass panes provides a huge increase in the insulation quality of the window and prevents condensation from forming inside as long as the window's inner air seal is unbroken.

These windows work well in houses, but in RVs the movement of being on the road puts a lot of strain on the seals. Seal failure is the reason windows fog.

There are rubber (or other material) seals that close off the inner air pocket in the window and prevent humidity from penetrating the two panels of glass, which are sealed and dry

when built at the factory. Once that seal is compromised, however, humidity is allowed to enter the air pocket of the window, resulting in condensation and fog.

Today, owners have several choices when it comes to restoring a clear view to their fogged dual pane windows. The easiest, but perhaps most expensive, is to simply buy and install new windows. You can do this on your own or take your RV to a service center and have them install a replacement window.

Another option is to have your windows removed and take them to a qualified glass/window shop and have them repair the windows. Some readers have reported good results with this method and it seems to be a reasonably priced option. Depending on the turnaround time, this also means that you need to have the RV covered while the windows are out.



STEP 1. Start from inside and remove the screws that secure the trim ring around the window. You'll need a helper outside to catch the window, as some are loose and fall out while others are tight and require more work.



STEP 2. Next, cut the adhesive sealant around the top of the window outside the rig. Be very careful and only slice deep enough to cut through the sealant and not into the sidewall.



STEP 3. Position one person inside the RV and one on the outside and push from the inside (or pull from the outside) to start removing the window. If it doesn't come out easily, use a rubber mallet to carefully tap the frame from the inside. Or use a plastic pry bar and gently slide it between the lip of the window and the outside of the body. It helps to have the window open to allow you to reach in or out when pushing and pulling on the window.

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#### REPAIRING DUAL PANE WINDOWS

As you search for a qualified shop, make sure to let them know they will be dealing with RV dual pane windows. Some shops simply will not or cannot make these kinds of repairs. We have also discovered that square or rectangular glass windows are a lot easier to work with than glass with rounded corners.

Some, but not all, of these windows are factory filled with argon or nitrogen, which is a dry gas ideal for occupying the space between the panes of glass. If you can find a facility that has the capability of refilling the space with a dry gas, your chances of success are a lot better because it is the moisture inside the cavity that causes the condensation. We have talked with some RVers who have performed their own DIY repair and they simply drilled a small hole in the window frame and used welding argon gas to inject inside the window cavity, then resealed the hole with silicone sealant.

There are RV-specific repair facilities that can do this work for you. In most cases, you bring your rig to the facility, they remove the windows one at a time and disassemble them completely. They then clean the glass to remove the fogging and reassemble the glass with completely new seals. They also use better materials in hopes of preventing this from recurring.

In some cases, the interior glass is etched beyond the point of normal cleaning or polishing and must be replaced. To try to prevent this, when you see fogging on your windows you should have them repaired soon rather than waiting months or years. The longer you wait the more difficult it is to remove the deposits.

Some of these companies also offer the option of shipping your windows to them for this repair service, so you perform the removal and reinstallation.

In several of these options, owners who are fairly handy can save money by doing their own removal and reinstallation. So, on these pages, we walk you through a basic how-to on removing and reinstalling a window.

Depending on the size of the window, you may need two or three people

to ensure the window can be safely removed and reinstalled from a ladder without risk to those performing the work. The window we replaced was fairly small and only required two people to completely remove it and install a new one.

You will need some basic tools such as a ladder, outdoor-rated clear sealant, a plastic scraper (to remove the old sealant) and a rubber mallet (just in case). You will also need to obtain the same type of gasket or butyl rubber sealing tape originally used by your RV manufacturer to seal the window. We installed a new window and it came with a new rubber self-adhesive gasket.

Of course, every RV manufacturer uses slightly different methods and parts so your process may vary slightly from the one shown here. Even if your method is slightly different, this offers you enough information to do the work yourself and save a lot of money in the process. If you prefer not to try this approach, we have included a list of companies that will do all the work for you. Some attend RV rallies, so check their schedule and you could save on driving, too.



STEP 4. Once the window starts to move, press it out evenly on the top and bottom to prevent it from getting crooked and caught in the opening. If it gets stuck, push it back in and start the process over.



STEP 5. Remove the window and set it aside to prepare for the new window. Using a plastic scraper, remove the old sealant from around the top of the window frame. Clean the inside of the window opening so the window will easily slide back into place.





STEP 6. This window uses a rubber gasket that must be attached to the frame before installing and it is critical that the seam be located at the bottom of the window. Take one end of the gasket material and start peeling the cover off the self-adhesive and apply it to the frame. If the frame is not 100 percent clean, be sure to wipe it down first so the adhesive will stick.

STEP 7. After the gasket has been applied all the way around the frame you will have to cut the gasket. It is better to cut it slightly long and then trim it shorter as needed. Make sure there is no gap in the seal or this can become an opening for moisture and air to enter the RV.



STEP 8. Next, lift the window into place from the outside of the RV and press it firmly into the window opening.



STEP 9. While one person is holding the window in place, start installing the window trim ring (from the inside) with a manual or power screwdriver and bit. Be sure to line up the trim ring with the predrilled holes in the window trim so the left and right halves of the trim go back exactly as they were made to line up the screw holes properly.



STEP 10. If you are careful with the alignment, the trim piece should match up like this with no unsightly gaps.



STEP 11. After installing all the screws, go back around the window two or three times to tighten each screw. This pulls the window firmly against the outside of the RV. You will have to judge the torque carefully or use a torque-limiting drill like the one shown here to prevent stripping the screw heads or window frame.



STEP 12. After the window is securely in place, apply a fine bead of high-quality, outdoor-rated sealant to the top and sides of the window. Use a fine bead to prevent getting the sealant on the outside wall. If you get any on the paint use a solvent-based bug and tar remover to clean it up before it cures. Allow the sealant to cure for 24 hours before exposing it to water.

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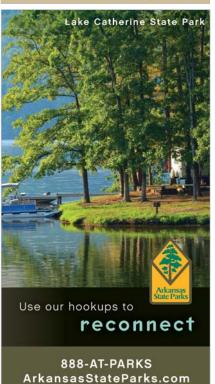

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# 10-MINUTETECH

A compilation of tried-and-true tips From RVers



#### LIGHT IT UP

We and our friends have fallen in love with simple, battery-operated, push-top lights for use in our RV and at the campsight. They have endless uses. Inside the RV, we use them for many things – from lighting up dark storage compartments to serving as an easy-to-use nightlight near the bed or in the bathroom. Outside, we've used them for dim lighting near the door or on a picnic table – we've even used them to help us back into a tight area at night. Decent ones can be purchased for less than \$10 each.





#### **NEVER WITHOUT A VISE** \*

I made a bracket on which to mount a swivel vise. The bracket is made with 2-inch square tubing and fits in a standard 2-inch receiver. I used a 19-inch steel tube coming out of the receiver squared up to a 13-inch tall vertical tube. For support, I welded an 11-inch long sheet steel bracket at an angle between the two pieces. On top of the vertical piece, I welded on a 6-inch square plate, in which I drilled three holes to mount the vise with 3/8-inch bolts. Don't forget to drill a 5/8-inch hole on the long horizontal piece for the pin in your hitch receiver.

#### MAINTENANCE MINDER

I just bought a new truck and expect to give it the same care and attention that permitted me to get top dollar for my old one. It's really simple. My maintenance schedule is based on a 3,000-mile interval reminder

Using a label maker, I first make a strip that reads: "Next service check due." This I affixed permanently to the face of the vehicle speedometer lens in a position where it does not block any instrumentation. Then, I just print out the mileage at which I will undertake necessary maintenance and position it below the first label.

After each service has been completed, I peel off the old numbers and replace them with a newly oriented label showing the next mileage interval at which maintenance will be due.

#### **PULL-TOP MAGIC**

Take the pull-top cap off of a quality water bottle (the type that you can pull up to let water out and then push down to close off the flow) and thread it onto a quart-sized bottle of motor oil. This has several advantages. First, it allows you more control over your oil bottle, reducing the chances of spilling and, in some cases, taking the place of a funnel. It also allows you to direct the oil into hard-to-reach places. And using a good pull-top seals the oil as well as the original oil cap for spill-proof storage.

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#### **TIRE TRAUMA**

had ST235/80R16 Goodyear Marathon tires on our 2010 Keystone Montana trailer. While traveling south on Route 85 in North Carolina, our driver's side rear tire blew out with such force that it damaged the side of the RV to the tune of \$982. Two days later the front tire blew out on the driver's side in South Carolina. These tires are rated to carry 3,420 pounds single and are made in China. I check the air pressure every morning for 80 psi in all four tires before we start the day. The shipping weight on the 2010 model 3455SA Montana is 12,270 pounds. The carrying capacity for the unit is 3,290 pounds for a total of 15,560 pounds max weight. The four Goodyear tires rated at 3,420 pounds come to 13,680 pounds.

Am I wrong in saying the tires on my RV are not the correct tires for the unit? I would think the four tires should be rated to carry at least the 15,560 pounds. When I took the RV to the dealer for repair, the body shop manager said he has seen a lot of these tires blow out and cause damage. The tire dealers are recommending a 12-or 14-ply tire for the unit. I'm going to replace all the tires on this unit with 12-ply tires rated at 3,960 pounds single. Goodyear says I must have hit something in the road to blow out the tires. Two new Goodyear tires cost us \$442.39. If there

I also replaced the rear passenger-side tire, as it does not look right to me. The tread is uneven and I did not want another blow out. These tires came on the new unit in 2009. The date code on the passenger tire is 1908. We do cover the tires when the unit is not being used and the tires are kept on plywood. We tow with a 2006 Chevy Silverado 2500 diesel. Any advice would be appreciated.

*Fifth-wheel trailers are designed to carry* about 20 percent of their weight on the hitch, so subtract 20 percent from the 15,560 maximum weight. That calculates to 12,448 pounds, which is how much of the maximum portion of the fully loaded trailer's weight should be carried by the tires. That figure is well below the 13,680 pounds the four tires are rated for. Tire manufacturers now use load ranges such as E and F, rather than ply ratings. Tire inflation pressure should be determined by actually weighing the loaded RV's axles on a truck scale and then referring to a loadinflation table from that tire manufacturer (available online or at tire dealers). A date code of 1908 means the tire was made in the 19th week of 2008, so age should not be the cause of failure. It is possible that the tires picked up nails or something, leaked down, got hot and blew apart. I've seen it a number of times where the first tires that run over an object stand it up, so a following tire will be punctured. In fact I've seen more punctures in rear tires than fronts.

Have a qualified shop check your trailer's axle alignment. This is an often-overlooked factor in excess tire failure situations. Also, having your trailer tires balanced is a good idea for the same reasons it's a good idea on your tow rig: The cost is low and you can add miles and years to your trailer tire lifespan. - Ken Freund

#### TRAILER HITCH BOUNCE

We recently retired and purchased a KZ Sportsman Classic with one axle. It weighs 2,700 pounds and measures 15 feet long. We tow it with a 2010 Jeep Grand Cherokee that is rated to tow 3,500 pounds. During our first outing, with slight exaggeration, it felt like we were in a small boat in a choppy sea. Our vehicle went up and down and sideways to our great discomfort. There was no wind and the trailer had no water and very little added weight. Since the Cherokee's hitch is so high we purchased a 9-inch drop coupling which makes the tow very close to level. I have been researching sway bars and the like but I am hesitant to purchase one as our vehicle's motion is more up and down than sideways.

Because you didn't specify the details I'm going to go out on a limb here, Pete, and conclude you're probably using a deadweight hitch rather than a weight-distributing (WD) hitch. If that's the case, that bouncing and weaving you feel is the result of the hitch weight on the hind end of your Cherokee. Not only does it load down the rear axle, it then unloads the front axle due to the leverage effect, with the rear axle acting as a fulcrum. Your front suspension and steering are designed to function at a certain ride height, which keeps the alignment correct for optimum steering response, and when you raise the front end a bit it throws off that alignment to some degree. It may feel as if a large bungee cord is attached to your front bumper and lifting the front of the car while driving.

When you traverse bumps or dips in the road, the combined effect of the Cherokee suspension and the trailer suspension flexing vertically plus the leverage of the hitch weight out back can indeed make for an uneasy ride. That's true even if the trailer is the right weight for your tow rig.

I'd recommend a WD hitch as your next equipment purchase. These hitches are available in a wide range of weight capacities and there's a right one for your setup that does the job without being overkill. It distributes the hitch weight to both of the tow rig's rear and front axles and lets you tow with your lashup on an even keel. The friction-type sway control is also a good idea to further keep lateral sway in check, and would be the next good investment. Also, be

sure your trailer has at least 10 or 11 percent of its overall weight on its hitch, as this also contributes to safe and stable towing. –J.J.

#### **HOT OVEN**

We have a 2001 Jayco Designer with an Atwood stove. Every time I turn on the oven it goes way past the designated temperature. Someone told us to put a piece of ceramic tile in the bottom. I did, but there was no difference. Then when I put it on the lower rack, it broke. I have to open the door and turn down the temperature all the time. I do have a little gauge hanging on the lower rack to adjust the temperature with. Anything you can advise would be helpful.

Some oven controls can be adjusted with reference to an oven thermometer. Check your owner's manual for the procedure. Ovens use temperature probes to determine the temperature. If necessary, replacing a temperature probe is relatively easy. Instructions vary by model of oven, so check with the manufacturer before attempting to replace a probe, or have it done by an RV shop. #### **POWER FOR A SAT SYSTEM**

We have a 2010 Keystone Cougar 26 BRS travel trailer. I recently purchased a Winegard GM1518 portable satellite system. The Winegard needs a cigarette lighter receptacle to plug into as it requires a 12-volt DC source of power. This trailer does not have a cigarette lighter receptacle like most fifth-wheels or motorhomes I've seen, so I am looking for suggestions on a power source for the Winegard.

You can buy cigarette-lighter type power receptacles through Camping World or auto parts stores like Pep Boys, NAPA, etc., for a few dollars. Depending on where you mount it, you might drill through a cabinet, or use a mounting bracket that often comes with the receptacle and hang it under a cabinet. You will need some flexible, insulated wire (it should be about 16 gauge). You can use lamp (zip) cord or separate wires. Run the ground wire from the outside of the socket

to a clean ground on the chassis. Run the positive wire as unobtrusively as possible (through cabinets, etc.) to the fuse panel. Connect it to power through a fuse and you're in business. **KF** 

#### **EXCESS BLOWOUTS**

I'm sorry to say we've had the same frequent-blowout trouble as Bill Phillips of Houston, Texas (RV Clinic, July 2011). We had a 31-foot Sunny Brook fifth-wheel. I can't remember how many blowouts we had before the right tire shop fixed the problem. The 15-inch load range C tires were too light. We went to a load range E 15-inch tire, and that was the end of our blowout trouble. I hope this is helpful.

It's good you found a successful solution to your problem, Vince. Going to higher-rated tires is one way to address frequent blowouts. It's also possible that the tires weren't too small, but the trailer may have been too heavy. Have you ever taken your trailer, loaded and ready for the road, to a public scale to weigh it and check that weight against the trailer's gross vehicle weight rating (gvwr)? It's possible the tires were an OK match for the trailer's gvwr, but if it was overloaded, all bets are off. Going to a higher-rated tire, while making sure your wheels are likewise rated to handle the higher load, is a good way to help avoid the problems. - J.J.

#### **PROPANE PROBLEM**

I have two 30-pound upright propane cylinders mounted to the A-frame of my travel trailer. The area where the cylinder base rings contact the base plate is rusting. I want to remove the cylinders to accomplish preservation work to both the contacting surfaces. Work on the base plate is simple, but to work on the cylinders will require turning them upside down. My cylinders are equipped with Overfill Protection Devices. Will inverting them cause any damage to the internal OPD mechanisms?

They are designed to take a jostling on the road. As long as you handle the cylinders gently, inverting them to sand and painting the bottoms shouldn't damage the OPD mechanisms. **KF** 

## AMERICA'S OUTBACK -->

## KNOXVILLE, Tennessee

## "A CULTURE FED BY THOSE WHO TEACH AND THOSE WHO LEARN NEVER LACKS FOR EXHILARATION."

've forgotten what it's like to break a nine-to-five workday with lunch in a wooded park where spring is rampant. And I can't remember the last time I laughed at kids running with feigned trepidation through sidewalk fountains: those mini-geysers that squirt from cement circles in outdoor malls. And dinner at a sidewalk café on a warm evening – it's been years.

It's nice to go back and have a serious look every so often. It keeps things in perspective and memories fresh. I'm in Knoxville, Tennessee. Not an overly big city, but it has more people in one place -185,000 – than any that I am used to in my travels.

The 400-acre campus of the University of Tennessee is here. A university always makes a place more vibrant, with its sports and special events, museums and libraries. A culture fed by those who teach and those who learn never lacks for exhilaration.

It's healthy for a city to have an allotment of young people that's higher than average. It raises the energy level. It gives the place a feeling of being relevant, contemporary and even on the edge. And Wi-Fi is in the air everywhere.

Knoxville is also a county seat. Here in the South, that means stately brick buildings – courthouses, old and new – each with a dignified steeple or at least a colorful dome.

The World's Fair was held here in 1982. From that, Knoxville emerged as a major metropolis.

The key player in its economic stability is the Tennessee

Valley Authority. With its headquarters here, the TVA oversees regional networks of dams, among other things. It was one of President Franklin Roosevelt's solutions, created in 1933, to lift the nation out of the depths of the Great Depression.

During the excavation process to build the dams along the Tennessee River, the TVA crews were careful to preserve the artifacts they uncovered. Those vestiges of earlier times are now in the McClung Museum at the university, rooms full of them actually.

To get a close look at the river that goes right



through town, I joined a group going out on the *Volunteer Princess*. It's a 96-foot yacht that urbanites take to for everything from a Sunday brunch to pizza and taco cruises. The boat was made in Wisconsin and delivered here using our inland river system.

Underway, I was chatting with the skipper. He gave me the wheel, saying that if I could navigate an RV across the country, I could probably get his \$2 million boat safely between a couple bridge stanchions. The correlation escaped me, but I did it.

Looking at a map, he showed me how the Tennessee River does something unique: It shows itself at both ends of the state, but does not pass through it. Forming here in eastern Tennessee, it heads south, exiting at the bottom of the state. Then it takes a westerly course across Alabama. Turning north, it re-enters Tennessee near Savanna, ending up in the Ohio River and completing a 652-mile U-turn.

We think of Nashville and Memphis, west of here, as being the core of country music in Tennessee. A musician told me, "Knoxville is Nashville without the industry pressure and with lower rents." Where else is there a live radio show that showcases county music performers? Broadcast

on two FM stations, it happens here every weekday at noon at the Café Gourmet in the Knoxville Visitor Center.

I had lunch there. A couple dozen country-rooted music fans made an appreciative audience. It was great.

And so is Knoxville. But that's enough of the city. I'm outta here.

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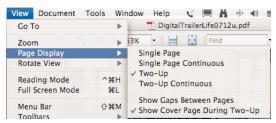


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
